

Jones Program in Ethics: Mini-Grants, 2020-21

The Jones Program in Ethics is pleased to announce a series of mini-grants for Laney Graduate School PhD student research projects. A successful proposal will highlight particular ways your project engages in ethics. This could include, but is not limited to, a philosophical question, a pragmatic application, or a challenge to, or support of, cultural and societal norms.

These grants will be awarded to individuals or groups who are engaged in the stated research project. Additionally, preference will be given to those who reach across programs and disciplines with colleagues to explore ethical questions. Winners will be required to make a public presentation of their work as a JPE 610 session during the Spring 2021 semester. Applicants must be in good standing with the Laney Graduate School and their programs at the time of application and the award period.

The mini-grants will support costs germane to the project such as supplies, or other properly argued and supported costs associated with the project. The grants will not support travel to conferences, training, or daily living expenses. Due to COVID-19, the JPE mini grants will not support projects that involve travel. The projects must also abide by current University policies around public health and safety.

We will grant up to four awards for AY2020-21 in the maximum amount of \$2,000 for each selected project.

Applications will be judged with particular attention paid to the following criteria:

1. How does the proposal exhibit and explain the ethical dimensions of your project?
2. Is the proposal well-written and clear enough for an interdisciplinary audience?
3. Is the project well thought out and put together with a reasonable timeline and budget?
4. How does this project fit into your career path?

Application Materials:

1. A current CV from all graduate students involved in the project
2. A proposal which details your project and argues its ethical dimensions. The proposal should be written for an interdisciplinary audience.
3. A timeline of the project.
4. A detailed budget with supporting documentation.

Applications which are incomplete or fail to follow directions will not be considered.
